PRE-AP/DC/AP SUMMER READING ASSIGNMENT PURPOSE

Boerne ISD believes that the key to being a great reader is to read extensively, and the key to being a great writer is through exposure to great writing. Reading is not solely reserved for the school year; life-long learning stems from becoming a life-long reader. Summer provides time to enjoy uninterrupted reading that allows students to absorb and contemplate ideas from their reading experience in preparation for beginning of the school year literary discussions. Summer reading and the subsequent in-class assignments give students a strong foundation to build upon as they move through the Pre-AP/DC/AP English Language Arts program.

If you are enrolled in the AP/Dual Credit English IV World Literature (BISD courses 1403 & 1414) there IS a summer reading requirement and you should check with your counselor or the BISD website for that list.

Summer reading suggestions

In the 3rd or 4th week of the course, we will have an assessment over one of the books from the list below that you will have read by this point. As the beginning of the year is often somewhat busy, you may want to read this book during the summer, although this is not absolutely necessary because you could read one in the first few weeks before the assessment. Those who wish to get a jump on the year, however, may choose one of the books from the list to read over the summer (it does not matter which one).
